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Is it safe to use Drano on a clogged toilet, or will it damage the pipes?

No, never use Drano or any chemical drain cleaner in a toilet. These products can damage your toilet's porcelain, harm your plumbing system, and create dangerous chemical reactions.

Why Drano is dangerous for toilets: Chemical drain cleaners like Drano are designed for sink and tub drains, not toilets. The chemicals can crack porcelain, especially older toilets, and the caustic ingredients can damage rubber seals and gaskets in your toilet's internal mechanisms. More importantly, if the Drano doesn't clear the clog, you'll have standing water filled with dangerous chemicals that can splash when you try other removal methods.

The bigger concern is your pipes. While modern PVC pipes can handle occasional chemical drain cleaner use, older cast iron or clay sewer lines common in many Ottawa homes can be damaged by repeated chemical exposure. If your toilet connects to older plumbing, these chemicals can accelerate pipe deterioration and lead to costly sewer line repairs down the road.

Safe toilet unclogging methods include using a toilet plunger (the cup-style plunger, not a sink plunger), a toilet auger for stubborn clogs, or hot water and dish soap for minor blockages. If these methods don't work after a few attempts, the clog is likely deeper in your sewer line and needs professional attention.

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My bathtub won't drain at all and there's standing water - what should I do?

Stop using the tub immediately and don't add any more water. A completely blocked drain with standing water indicates a serious clog that needs prompt attention to prevent overflow and potential water damage.

Start with these immediate steps: First, remove as much standing water as possible using a bucket or large cup - this will make the repair easier and reduce the risk of overflow. Once you can see the drain, remove the drain stopper or strainer and clear out any visible hair, soap scum, or debris with your hands or needle-nose pliers. Sometimes this surface blockage is the entire problem.

If the drain is still blocked after clearing the visible debris, you're dealing with a deeper clog in the drain line. You can try a plunger specifically designed for tubs (with a flat bottom), but avoid chemical drain cleaners as they can damage pipes and create hazardous conditions with standing water. The clog is likely in the P-trap or further down the drain line, which requires professional equipment to clear safely.

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My toilets are bubbling when I run the washing machine - is this a sewer problem?

Yes, this is likely a sewer line problem. When toilets bubble during washing machine use, it typically indicates a blockage or restriction in your main sewer line that's preventing proper drainage and causing air displacement.

What's happening is that your washing machine discharges a large volume of water quickly into the drain system. If there's a blockage downstream in your main sewer line, this water has nowhere to go and creates back-pressure in the system. The air gets pushed back up through the toilet drains, causing the bubbling you're hearing. This is essentially your plumbing system's way of "burping" because it can't handle the water flow properly.

In Ottawa homes, this problem is particularly common in older neighborhoods with mature trees, as tree roots often infiltrate clay sewer pipes over time. 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My toilet keeps running after I flush. How do I fix this?

A running toilet is usually caused by a faulty flapper, chain adjustment issue, or water level problem - most of these are simple DIY fixes that can save you from wasting hundreds of gallons of water per day.

Start by checking the flapper at the bottom of the toilet tank. Remove the toilet tank lid and look inside - the rubber flapper should create a tight seal over the flush valve opening. If it's warped, cracked, or has mineral buildup preventing a proper seal, it needs replacement. You can find replacement flappers at any hardware store for about \$5-10.

Next, examine the chain connecting the flush handle to the flapper. If the chain is too long, the flapper won't lift fully when you flush. If it's too short, the flapper can't close properly. Adjust the chain so there's about 1/2 inch of slack when the flapper is closed. Sometimes the chain gets tangled or disconnected entirely - a quick reattachment usually solves the problem.

Check your water level - it should sit about 1 inch below the rim of the toilet tank. If water is continuously flowing into the overflow tube, the fill valve may be stuck or the float needs adjustment. For older toilets with a ball float, gently bend the arm downward to lower the water level. For newer toilets with a cylinder float, there's usually an adjustment screw.

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My bathroom faucet is dripping constantly - is this an easy fix?

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Why does my toilet randomly run for a few seconds throughout the day?

Your toilet is likely running due to a **faulty flapper that isn't sealing properly, allowing water to slowly leak from the tank into the bowl**. When the water level drops enough, the fill valve automatically kicks in to refill the tank, causing those random running episodes.

The most common culprit is a **warped or mineral-encrusted flapper** that no longer creates a watertight seal at the bottom of the tank. 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How much does rough-in plumbing cost for a basement bathroom?

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Do I need a permit to add a bathroom in my basement?

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How often should I replace toilet flappers and other parts?

Toilet flappers typically need replacement every 3-5 years, though this varies based on water quality and usage. The rubber deteriorates over time, becoming warped or losing flexibility, which causes your toilet to run continuously and waste water.

Signs your flapper needs replacement include a toilet that runs frequently, water continuously flowing into the bowl, or a flapper that feels slimy, warped, or doesn't seal properly against the flush valve seat. You might also notice your water bill increasing due to the constant water loss. 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Is it hard to install a toilet yourself?

Installing a toilet yourself is **moderately challenging** for most DIYers, but definitely doable if you're comfortable with basic plumbing tasks and have the right tools. The main difficulty comes from the toilet's weight (60-100 pounds) and ensuring proper sealing to prevent leaks.

The installation process involves removing the old toilet, cleaning the flange, installing a new wax ring, positioning the new toilet carefully, and securing it with bolts. You'll also need to connect the water supply line and test for leaks.
