Can I install a tankless water heater myself or do I need a plumber?

Installing a tankless water heater requires a licensed plumber in Ontario - this is not a DIY project due to gas, electrical, and plumbing code requirements that need professional expertise and permits.

Tankless water heater installation involves multiple complex systems that must be done correctly for safety and code compliance. **Gas units require proper venting, gas line sizing, and combustion air calculations** that only licensed gas technicians can perform. Electric units need dedicated high-amperage circuits (often 100-150 amps total) that require an electrician. 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I found a small leak under my bathroom sink. Can I fix it myself?

Small leaks under bathroom sinks can often be fixed by homeowners if they're coming from loose connections, but the approach depends on exactly where the leak is located.

Start by identifying the leak source with a flashlight. Most bathroom sink leaks occur at three common spots: the **supply line connections** where water lines connect to the shut-off valves or faucet, the **P-trap connections** where the curved drain pipe connects, or the **faucet tailpiece** where the faucet connects to the drain assembly. If water is dripping from these connection points, you can often fix it by gently tightening the nuts with a wrench - but be careful not to overtighten, as this can crack fittings or damage threads.

Before starting any work, turn off the water supply using the shut-off valves under the sink (turn clockwise). If the leak is from a loose supply line connection, try tightening the compression nut about a quarter turn. For P-trap leaks, the slip nuts can usually be hand-tightened or gently snugged with pliers. However, if you see water coming from **within the pipe walls, corroded fittings**, or if tightening doesn't stop the leak, this indicates a more serious problem requiring professional repair.

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Can I replace a two-handle shower faucet with a single handle myself?

Yes, you can replace a two-handle shower faucet with a single-handle model yourself if you're comfortable with basic plumbing tasks, but this project involves more complexity than a simple faucet swap and may require additional plumbing modifications.

The main challenge is that **two-handle and single-handle faucets have different rough-in valve configurations**. 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Can I install a dishwasher myself or do I need a plumber?

Safe thawing methods include using a hair dryer, space heater, or warm towels applied to the frozen pipe section. Work from the faucet end toward the blockage, and keep the faucet open so water can flow as ice melts. Never use open flames, blowtorches, or other high-heat sources as these can damage pipes or create fire hazards. 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What plumbing work can I do myself without a permit?

In Ottawa, you can perform basic maintenance and minor repairs without permits, but most plumbing work requires permits and licensed professionals.

Basic DIY plumbing tasks that typically don't require permits include unclogging drains with a plunger or snake, replacing toilet seats, fixing running toilets by adjusting the flapper or chain, replacing faucet aerators and showerheads, and minor leak repairs like tightening connections or replacing washers. You can also perform routine maintenance like cleaning drain traps under sinks or replacing toilet fill valves.
